
Standing Stone FFA—We've been busy!

The Standing Stone FFA chapter has been busy this year traveling, selling, and learning about agriculture in every aspect. They kicked off their year with officer inaugurations, each student had to provide 3 paragraphs about what the FFA means to them, why they want to be an officer, and why they would be good at their office. Hunter Einodshofer was elected president, Rachel Householder vice president, Sydney Barnett secretary, Lissy Kinder treasurer, Katie Shultz assistant treasurer, Madison Buckley reporter, Taylor Wertz chaplain, and Owen Kauffman sentinel. Soon after elections, these officers started their leadership roles by taking a weekend trip to the lake with a neighboring chapter's officers to get ideas and establish expectations for the upcoming year. As for the members of Standing Stone FFA, they studied hard and tested their knowledge at this year's state convention held at Penn State University. They were pleased with their results especially since their agronomy team placed first and won a trip to national convention where they would compete against teams from all over the U.S.



Though every member's favorite time of the year is fair time and this year's team of FFA members took "the W." Each student spent their summer expanding their herd sizes and preparing their animals for show day which in the end paid off when many members took home grand champion. Also, Dana Myers and Rachel Householder who are members of Standing Stone FFA were crowned Fair Queen and Alternate Fair Queen.

Come fall, FFA members kicked off the school year with their traditional fall sandwich sale which brings members together as a team to assemble the 365 sandwiches sold. This fundraiser helped students to pay for fall field trips like Career Development Events, and Ag in the Classroom at the fairgrounds. At Ag in the Classroom, students get the chance to prepare a fifteen minute presentation about anything that relates to agriculture which they presented to fourth graders from Standing Stone, Southside, and Juniata Valley Elementary schools. This fall, ten dedicated members drove to Indianapolis for National convention where the Agronomy team would compete and others would learn about what kind of roles agriculture has in today's society. Our new members and officers were able to learn more about what the FFA organization stands for and how to take advantage of the many opportunities FFA has to offer at the annual Fall Leadership Conference. FFA members were able to test their athletic abilities at Juniata FFA's annual volleyball tournament though they lacked hand-eye coordination; their team learned to step out of their comfort zone and work as a team. Recently, Standing Stone FFA members finished their famous fruit and poinsettia sale where they sold over 1300 items. Members even came together to sell some extra fruit at Tractor Supply while taking donations for the Huntingdon County Humane Society. Standing Stone FFA chapter has been very busy this year and even though the holidays are coming up, students are already hard at work planning more fundraisers, field trips, and community service projects for when their break is over.



HAHS State Wrestling Champ Signs for Edinboro College!

Huntingdon's Senior Jacob Oliver, State Wrestling Champion at 170, signed his national letter of intent for Edinboro College on November 10th at 3 pm. A small reception was held in Jacob's honor after the signing.

STEM Classrooms at HAMS!

The middle school students have been busy in STEM this year! Sixth grade started off the year with a two-part flight unit. During this unit, our students learned about the different forces that affect flight, calculated speed using their measured distance and flight time, and re-researched famous astronauts. With a small group of their peers, students designed, built, and tested a water bottle rocket and a paper airplane. Continuing with the space travel theme, our sixth grade students started learning about heat



in order to design a heat shield that would protect an egg-stronaut. This unit was modeled after the heat shield tiles that NASA uses to protect astronauts as their space shuttles return to Earth. Before designing and building their heat shields, the students learned how to convert between the three temperature scales, Fahrenheit, Celsius, and Kelvin, and how heat moves through conduction, convection, and radiation. Using what they had learned, the students created a heat shield out of materials like aluminum foil, wire mesh, felt, steel, and spackle.



Seventh and eighth grade began the year learning about electricity and magnetism. They explored the relationship between electric currents and magnetic fields and learned how to create a circuit. Using this information, the students designed an electromagnetic apparatus that allowed a pop-up card to open itself. Thanks to the Lowe's Toolbox for Education grant, our students also designed and built a float for the Homecoming Parade during this time. Next, the seventh and eighth grade students started a plant unit where they learned about the different characteristics of plants, the various adaptations of invasive plants that allow them to survive and thrive anywhere in the world, and how to design something in three-dimensions using CAD. The students designed a trail sign that will be 3D printed and placed along a local nature trail in the spring. Students also participated in a maple seed design challenge and created an original invasive plant that contained several adap-

Exploration of High School and Post-Secondary Options

8th Grade Tour—

All 8th grade students toured the Huntingdon County Career and Technology Center in Mill Creek, PA. on Thursday, December 22, 2016. HCCTC provides an educational environment emphasizing integration of academic and technical experiences. After completion of select programs, graduates can seek immediate employment in the challenging, competitive world of work. Others may pursue post-secondary education at institutions of higher learning. Students will view programs including automotive mechanics, carpentry, electrical occupations, precision machining, welding, cosmetology, culinary arts, health occupations, heating, ventilation & air conditioning, collision repair, and public health & safety. The excursion to HCCTC will be a positive experience that will allow students to ponder life beyond the Huntingdon Middle School and learn about post-secondary options.

Visit to Juniata College—

On December 8th, a small group of students toured the campus of Juniata College. The purpose of the event was to expose young people to post-secondary options. Participants enjoyed learning about the different programs at Juniata College and the rigorous admission requirements. The students were appreciative of the opportunity and expressed enthusiasm regarding career aspirations for the future.

Presentation by West Point Cadet—

Madeline Suba, a former graduate of HAHS and sophomore at West Point Academy, met with students regarding military life. Madeline offered valuable advice to those considering the difficult application process to a military academy. Students were encouraged to be physically active, take challenging courses, and volunteer time in service organizations. Madeline is majoring in history and plans to pursue law school.

Career Presenter—

On December 20th, Kammy Laird, School Principal for the Department of Corrections in Smithfield, presented information about a program called Canine Partners for Life. Ms. Laird brought four labrador retriever puppies to HAMS during the lunch periods. She explained how the dogs are trained and how individuals with health impairments benefit from them. Ms. Laird also offered a list of possible careers in state correctional facilities.
