

## ARP ESSER Health and Safety Plan Guidance & Template

Section 2001(i)(1) of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires each local education agency (LEA) that receives funding under the ARP Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website a Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan, hereinafter referred to as a Health and Safety Plan.

Based on ARP requirements, 90 percent of ARP ESSER funds will be distributed to school districts and charter schools based on their relative share of Title I-A funding in FY 2020-2021. Given Federally required timelines, LEAs eligible to apply for and receive this portion of the ARP ESSER funding must submit a Health and Safety Plan that meets ARP Act requirements to the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) by Friday, July 30, 2021, regardless of when the LEA submits its ARP ESSER application.

Each LEA must create a Health and Safety Plan that addresses how it will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff, and which will serve as local guidelines for all instructional and non-instructional school activities during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. The Health and Safety Plan should be tailored to the unique needs of each LEA and its schools and must take into account public comment related to the development of, and subsequent revisions to, the Health and Safety Plan.

The ARP Act and U.S. Department of Education rules require Health and Safety plans include the following components:

- How the LEA will, to the greatest extent practicable, implement prevention and mitigation
  policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the Centers for Disease Control
  and Prevention (CDC) for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to
  continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning;
- 2. How the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services;

- 3. How the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policy on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC:
  - a. Universal and correct wearing of masks;
  - b. Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);
  - c. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette;
  - d. <u>Cleaning</u> and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving <u>ventilation</u>;
  - e. <u>Contact tracing</u> in combination with <u>isolation</u> and <u>quarantine</u>, in collaboration with State and local health departments;
  - f. <u>Diagnostic</u> and screening testing;
  - g. Efforts to provide COVID-19 vaccinations to school communities;
  - Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and
  - i. Coordination with state and local health officials.

The LEA's Health and Safety Plan must be approved by its governing body and posted on the LEA's publicly available website by July 30, 2021.\* The ARP Act requires LEAs to post their Health and Safety Plans online in a language that parents/caregivers can understand, or, if it is not practicable to provide written translations to an individual with limited English proficiency, be orally translated. The plan also must be provided in an alternative format accessible, upon request, by a parent who is an individual with a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Each LEA will upload in the eGrants system its updated Health and Safety Plan and webpage URL where the plan is located on the LEA's publicly available website.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to review their Health and Safety Plans at least every six months during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. LEAs also must review and update their plans whenever there are significant changes to the CDC recommendations for K-12 schools. Like the development of the plan, all revisions must be informed by community input and reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the LEA's publicly available website.

LEAs may use the template to revise their current Health and Safety Plans to meet ARP requirements and ensure all stakeholders are fully informed of the LEA's plan to safely resume instructional and non-instructional school activities, including in-person learning, for the current school year. An LEA may use a different plan template or format provided it includes all the elements required by the ARP Act, as listed above.

\* The July 30 deadline applies only to school districts and charter schools that received federal Title I-A funds in FY 2020-2021 and intend to apply for and receive ARP ESSER funding.

## Health and Safety Plan Summary: Huntingdon Area School District (HASD)

How will the LEA, to the greatest extent practicable, support prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the CDC for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning?

All HASD activities and decisions will be informed by the PA DOH, PDE, and our partner districts & agencies. Depending upon the public health conditions in any county within the Commonwealth, there could be additional actions, orders, or guidance provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) and/or the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH). The District will practice and support prevention and mitigation efforts in response to the changing conditions. The District is prepared to practice prevention and mitigation strategies along a continuum of most to least restrictive strategies in response to the changing conditions of the Pandemic. In addition to practicing standard preventative measures such as handwashing, cleaning practices, and the option of PPE, the District will continue to encourage the vaccination of students and staff. The District will continue to practice standard mitigation efforts to include reducing close contact when feasible. As long as there are cases of COVID-19 in the community, there are no strategies that can completely eliminate transmission risk within a school population. Students and staff who have not been vaccinated are encouraged to wear face coverings while in school.

1. How will the LEA ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services?

The HASD will continue to provide school counseling, social work, Student Assistance Program (SAP), tiered academic and behavioral interventions, and after school programming. Staff will review trauma-informed care practices through continued professional learning. Breakfast and lunch will continue to be provided for all district learners free of charge during the 21-22 school year.

ARP ESSER Requirement	Strategies, Policies, and Procedures
a. Universal and correct wearing of masks;	The district will implement masking as optional for K-12 students and employees on December 14, 2021. Students in the pre-k classrooms will continue to be required to mask due to the lack of ability to be vaccinated. The district will communicate effective face covering practices to all students and staff choosing to wear masks. Please note that this decision does not impact the federal directive requiring all passengers and drivers to wear a mask on school buses. Students and drivers must continue to wear masks on school buses. All implementation strategies will adhere to the student's IEP or 504 Plan. The plan will be adjusted with board approval if there is found to be a need for universal masking to mitigate the virus.
b. Modifying facilities to allow for <u>physical</u> <u>distancing</u> (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);	Follow the current CDC, PA DOH, and PDE guidelines for physical distancing. All implementation strategies will adhere to the student's IEP or 504 Plan. When feasible, reduce opportunities for close contact to the greatest extent possible. Provide standard PPE for all staff and students upon request.

Follow the current CDC, PA DOH, and PDE guidelines for handwashing and respiratory etiquette. Signage will continue to be posted to remind students and staff of proper handwashing techniques. A review of proper handwashing techniques and respiratory etiquette will be demonstrated to kindergarten students and reviewed with other students when staff identifies a need. Hand sanitizer will continue to be available to all students and staff. All will be encouraged to use the sanitizer.

 d. <u>Cleaning</u> and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving <u>ventilation</u>; Follow the current CDC, PA DOH, and PDE guidelines for cleaning and ventilation. Cleaning will regularly be conducted by custodial staff.
Opportunities for classes to be outside will be utilized, when possible. A revamp and upgrade of the District's HVAC system was conducted during the 2020-2021 school year.

e. <u>Contact tracing</u> in combination with <u>isolation</u> and <u>quarantine</u>, in collaboration with the State and local health departments;

In alignment with requirements in title 28 Pa.Code Chapter 7(relating to communicable noncommunicable disease), the district will report positive cases of COVID-19 to DOH for case investigation, contact tracing, and issuance of quarantine and/or isolation orders and exclude school children and staff from having contact with other school children or staff showing symptoms of a communicable disease. School officials have the authority to restrict people who are at risk of spreading COVID-19 from entering the school building. HASD will continue to work with our local DOH to contact, investigate and quarantine those individuals who were within 3 feet of a positive case for 15 minutes or longer. The length of quarantine will adhere to Department of Health guidelines. Parents/Guardians of students who are identified as close contacts, regardless

of vaccination status, have three options for their child: Test Upon notification of exposure. On day five the student may be tested by the family's healthcare or outside provider. Upon a negative test being received, the student returns. Quarantine behind the mask for 10 days after their last date of exposure. Students must properly wear a mask for 10 days while in the school setting. If proper mask wearing is not followed the student will be asked to quarantine at home for the remainder of the quarantine period. Quarantine at home for 10 days. The student must participate in assigned education in order for the days to be counted toward their attendance. Teachers will be required to have updated seating charts in their classrooms in the event contact tracing needs to take place. Seating charts on buses will be required. f. <u>Diagnostic</u> and screening testing; School nurses will monitor students' health during the day and make appropriate recommendations for parents with regards to follow up. g. Efforts to provide <u>vaccinations to</u> In collaboration with local health providers school communities; in Huntingdon County, the District will host vaccine clinics for eligible students and staff. All IEP and 504 plans will be implemented h. Appropriate accommodations for and revised when needed based on the students with disabilities with respect needs of the individual student. to health and safety policies; and

i. Coordination with state and local health officials.

Maintain existing partnerships with local and state PA DOH, PDE, and emergency management. Refer to PA DOH as needed for guidance on responding to COVID situations.
