8-BEARS

The spring time presents so many opportunities to be active outside. We have all been pinned up inside all winter and are ready get out and move. We have always taken advantage of this bottled up energy, with the motivator of bonus points, to encourage students to be stewards of the environment and make a difference. Thirty-five Huntingdon students, MS and HS, four parents and three teachers took advantage of an opportunity to do just this by representing our school at the Raystown Lake Cleanup Day on April 20. The day is sponsored by the Army Corp. of Engineers and the Friends of Raystown Lake. It occurs every year around Earth Day, and Huntingdon students have been involved for the past seven years. Even with the cold temperature, the students were dedicated and did a great job collecting 1,400 lbs of trash and 1,000 lbs of recyclable materials. Thank you to all the students and families who helped make our community cleaner. Your work is greatly appreciated.

Another opportunity for the 8 Bears will be coming up shortly. Tuesday, May 28 will be our Trout in the Classroom release day at the C. Barton McCann School of Art. The students have been observing, studying and raising about eighty Brook Trout from eggs to three inch fry. We will be releasing the trout in Laural Run during a field trip that will include stations focused on fly casting, fly tying, stream study and the art of Gyotaku and leaf printing. It is the second annual release day and is the culminating activity of a yearlong focus of conservation, community and cross curricular activities. 8-CATS Monster Quest Activity

To cap off the year, the 8 Cats will read *The Colomber* by Dino Buzzati. *The Colomber* is a short story about a mythical sea creature believed to be scary and dangerous; a real live Loch Ness Monster of sorts. Throughout the story it is believed that this creature is out to harm humans, but Buzzati offers his readers an ironic twist of fate at the end. After reading this story with creatures, fantasy and magical realism students are asked to create their own mythical creature in the fashion of the History Channel's program *Monster Quest. Monster Quest* is a documentary series which has its subjects search for various mythological and paranormal creatures, such as Bigfoot, the Real Life Hobbit, and the American Werewolf.

Monster Quest is the final team activity for the 8th grade year and requires students to incorporate components from Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, and Math to tell the story of their mythical monster. Students will work in small groups and have the following options to tell the story of their mythical creature:

Students can write a graphic novel; which is very similar to a comic strip, but its purpose is to be a stand-alone story and not to tell a joke. Choosing this option will allow students to showcase their writing and artistic abilities.Students can work on creating a video which will feature a search for their "Monster" in real life locales. This seems to be the popular choice among students thus far.

A skit or drama may be performed live in class which needs to contain visual elements such as props or costumes and must be accompanied by some form of audio.

Students can choose to create a Tri-fold and PowerPoint Presentation which will detail information about their "Monster."

Perhaps the most creative option is for students to "Create Their Own Quest." This project will involve their classmates in a scavenger hunt that takes them on a quest or journey to uncover the mystery behind their creature. Each group will create clues to further shed light on the mythical being they have discovered. By the end of the quest, their classmates will have a better understanding of the creature and the legend surrounding its existence.

Many students are excited about the upcoming project and are already planning their monster in preparation.

If you find yourself in the 8th grade hallway in the near future stay vigilant and keep your head on a swivel, you may just come face to face with a real life monster (there is believed to be one in Mr. Orenshaw's room)!



7–BEARS

Having a Super Year in Science

Seventh grade students at the Middle School have a very exciting year in science because they are exposed to a wide array of topics in life and physical science. These topics include cells, heredity, viruses, animals, bacteria, protists, fungus, plants, motion and energy.

So far, 7-Bears have enjoyed studying the six kingdoms of life through an assortment of projects and hands-on experiences. Students on the 7-Bears team began the year by creating viruses, growing fungus and collecting bacterial cells from around the school, which they watched grow and reproduce on nutrient agar. After studying viruses and bacteria, students learned how easy infectious diseases could spread by performing an experiment that used phenol red and sodium hydroxide to spread a "disease" around the classroom. Before beginning to study the animal kingdom, students also had an opportunity to view protists under the microscope.

Heredity is the last subject matter covered in life science and seems to be the students' favorite topic. While studying genetics, students learn about dominant and recessive traits, genetic disorders, human inheritance and probability. Students get an opportunity to view traits, such as fur color, and create punnett squares to determine the probability of these traits being passed to future generations. They also are able to build DNA models using K'Nex. To conclude genetics, students build "Reebops," a genetic creation, from marshmallows and other assorted snacks. During this project, students are given the genes of two parent "Reebops" and are asked to use punnett squares to determine the traits of the next generation of "Reebops." Students then determine what their "baby Reebop" would look like and create it using a variety of snacks.

In conclusion, the 7th Grade Bears have had a very exciting year studying life science and have many stimulating, hands-on labs to look forward to in physical science during the last few weeks of this school year.

7-CATS

Students are on a 'field trip' visiting Nory Ryan who lived near Maidin Bay in Ireland. They have been warped back in time to the mid-1800's during the Irish potato famine. English Lord Cunningham has taken ownership of all of their land and is exiling those who cannot pay their rent to him. Because of that, Nory loses her little beggar friend, Cat Neely.

Every year Nory's family plants potatoes while her father leaves on a fishing boat to earn the rent money for Lord Cunningham. Disaster hits, and Nory dreams of a time when she and her family can escape and all live in America together.


At the conclusion of the novel study, students will be enjoying potato cakes, dulce, blueberries, and a sip of milk. Then they will be presenting their "scrapbooks", "hope chests", or "suitcases" to the class. If you're wondering what that's all about, just ask your child.

This story continues in other novels, Maggie's Door and Water Street.

Students in science class are exploring the six kingdoms of life. In the first section, students extracted protists from termites to investigate their mutualistic relationship. Students are currently studying fungi by experimenting with mold growth on bread. Next, students will be determining the effects of hand sanitizer on bacterial growth.

In Holt 2 we are working on classifying different types of polygons using their properties. In Algebra we are in chapter 10 focusing on probability and data displays. The Algebra students are also working on preparing for the upcoming Keystone Exam. In Pre-Algebra the students are solving multi-step equations and inequalities.

In Language Arts, students are exploring *The Outsiders*. They will be taking a close look at social groups as well as the many themes of friendship within the novel. At the conclusion of the unit, students will be looking closely at the characters in the novel as well as the importance of dialogue. They will also get an opportunity to view the film version of the novel and complete a project.



6-BEARS Celebrating Poetry Month with the 6 BEARS

National Poetry Month is a month-long, national celebration of poetry established by the Academy of American Poets in 1996. The concept is to widen the attention of individuals and the media—to the art of poetry, to living poets, to our complex poetic heritage, and to poetry books and journals of wide aesthetic range and concern. The hope is to increase the visibility and availability of poetry in popular culture while acknowledging and celebrating poetry's ability to sustain itself in the many places where it is practiced and appreciated.

Mr. Mitchell and Mrs. Sellers combined two consecutive class periods to extend the amount of time that poetry could be read, shared, and created. It was a relaxing way to follow up a week of PSSA testing. A typical start to a period involved several students sharing a favorite poem aloud to the combined classrooms. It was interesting to see some unexpected candidates *shine* when reading and writing poetry.

The students became poets when they created Found poems. They searched magazines for interesting words. After cutting out twenty to thirty words, they composed some deep and meaningful poems. The students also had fun creating truth/lie poems. Four truths and four lies were intermingled on the paper. Other students were given the task of trying to decide what to believe and what not to believe. The poems made for very interesting reading.

There will be a "Coffee House" celebration at the completion of the poetry unit. The Coffee House will take place in Mrs. Sellers and Mr. Mitchell's rooms. The rooms will be transformed into a lamp lit café with a lighted stage. The students will bring in drinks and snacks to share with each other. It will be a *snapping* good time.

The 6 Cats Get Competitive

When most of us hear the word competition – SPORTS springs to mind; but if you ask a student on the 6 Cats team what competition is, you might be surprised by their answer. My Economics class recently completed a unit of study on Economic competition and the culminating activity allowed the students to share their competitive nature and enthusiasm. The students were asked to create a beverage and design an advertising campaign for their product. Strawberry Twister, Tropical Hawaiian Surprise, Fruit Explosion, Strawberry Shortcake Paradise, and Pineapple Slushie Delight are just a few of the clever names the students gave to their products. The posters included slogans, health benefits, sponsors, and much more. Several students shared their tech-savvy skills by creating commercials for their products with the i-movie application on i-pads. The class developed taste-testers of their products. Some groups even gave out candy as an incentive to their peers to vote for their drink.



As the taste-testing concluded, the students were given one ballot to vote for their favorite drink. This year's victor was a homemade concoction by Anna Snook titled "Chocolate Party." Anna used a blender to mix chocolate ice cream into a milkshake and added random toppings to create her delicious treat. Many parents are surprised by the topics covered in our 6th grade Economics classes including Economics systems, budgeting strategies, the labor force, and so much more; but the students rise to the challenge with this difficult material and often impress their teachers and peers with their enthusiasm and understanding.

Two important items will be taking effect in the HAMS cafeteria in May. Starting Tuesday, May 7, 2013, students will be offered additional main entrée choices during all lunch periods. Students will have at least three choices each day. Students may choose from the regular lunch entree, the second entrée choice and an A La Carte entrée choice. The cafeteria will eventually be offering up to five entrée choices for students based on acceptability and cost. By doing so, we will be able to utilize more of the available resources for students in the cafeteria. Students can also purchase additional lunch items after everyone has been served. ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance at school is necessary for a good educational experience. If a student is under the compulsory school attendance law, proper steps will be taken to enforce that law. Unexcused absences will result in no credit for the day and no opportunity to make up work that was missed.

When a student returns to school after an absence, the student must report to the office during homeroom and present a properly signed written excuse. If you have obtained a written doctor excuse, please send this excuse also. The student has 3 days after his/her return to school to bring this note. Failure to bring a proper excuse within 3 days will result in 1 illegal day.

The Huntingdon Area School District attendance policy provides that a <u>claim</u> of continual or repeated illness in excess of 10 days per school year requires a physician's statement regarding illness. If a student has absences in excess of 10 days with no medical excuse, the absences will be considered illegal. Students whose absence is determined to be illegal will not be allowed to make up their work.

Parents will receive an attendance letter in the mail after 10 days of recorded absences and doctor's excuses will be required. State legislation stipulates that students (and/or their parents) may be fined for excessive absences.

TARDY TO HOMEROOM

Students are responsible for being in class on time. A reasonable amount of time is provided for changing classes. Teachers will keep appropriate records and work with students to resolve problems of tardiness. Disciplinary consequences are listed below:

Procedure for handling tardiness -

- 1. Student/Teacher conference 1st tardy
- Student/Assistant Principal conference 2nd tardy
- 3. Letter sent home -3^{rd} tardy
- 4. After School Detention 4th tardy
- 5. Two After School Detentions 5th tardy
- 6. Administrative discretion 6 or more tardies
