#### Sixth Graders Step into History

Recently, our sixth graders had a special visitor. Mr. Lesniewski, a local Civil War enthusiast, shared his knowledge with our students. They were fascinated and bombarded Mr. L with questions. He engaged the students with visual aids and video clips on the Smart-board. The students found it unbelievable that anyone would be willing to be the "flag bearer" in battle since that soldier was an easy target - unable to carry a weapon and defend themselves.

Mr. Lesniewski brought a regimental flag from the 20<sup>th</sup> Maine. He explained the many dangers the soldiers faced both on and off the battlefield. The students were surprised to learn that more soldiers died from illness and infections rather than in battle. He also discussed the role of women in the war; including those who worked as spies, other women who served as nurses in the medical field, and some who chose to cut their hair and disguise themselves as men to fight for a cause they believed in.

Mr. Lesniewski discussed the many weapons used by the infantry, sharpshooters, and officers during these battles. The students found the story of 'Sherman's Bow Ties' intriguing and asked several questions about how the Union soldiers could wrap railroad ties around trees. At times, it can be a difficult for teachers to motivate our learners, but inviting presenters to share their knowledge and experiences with our students is an invaluable tool and just one way our local community supports learning at HAMS.

### Sixth Grade

On November 19 (Bears) and November 21 (Cats), the sixth graders at Huntingdon Area Middle School will be participating in an outdoor educational program at Shaver's Creek Environmental Center. Some of the goals for the day include building a sense of unity among students, building cooperation and teamwork skills within small groups, and working on problem solving and leadership skills. In addition, students will practice treating each other with respect and understanding that all students are equal and have different perspectives. In the afternoon, students will be enjoying a scavenger hunt in the discovery room and raptor center, and taking a hike through the wetlands.

Since the program will continue regardless of the weather, students should dress in layers. From previous years, we have learned that many students do not dress warmly enough. Temperatures at Shaver's Creek can be up to ten degrees cooler than Huntingdon and most activities take place in the shade, so please be sure that your child is dressed in sweatshirts, winter coats, warm shoes, gloves, and hats. If it warms up in the afternoon, students will be permitted to shed layers. Raincoats and mud boots are suggested for rainy weather. Students will be outside for approximately five hours, so please dress accordingly.

Kudos to Shaver's Creek for reaching a goal of being a zero waste facility! This means that whatever students carry in, they will carry out. No trash will be thrown out. Please bring drinks and lunches in reusable containers. Also, pack a water bottle for your child – preferably a reusable water bottle. ### Classroom Diagnostic Tools (CDT)

This year, our students are using an online based program through the Pennsylvania Department of Education called Classroom Diagnostic Tools (or CDT, not to be confused with the *Centre Daily Times*).

As described on their website, https:// pa.drcedirect.com, "the CDT are a set of online assessments designed to measure specific student strengths, weaknesses, skills, and knowledge throughout the school year to help guide instruction and remediation. The online assessments are available for students in grades six through high school and are fully aligned with the Standards Aligned System (SAS). The assessments are based on content covered by the Keystone Exams and the Pennsylvania System of School Assessments (PSSA)."

Our students have taken these assessments in the content areas of math, reading, science and writing. The first round of testing established a base line to identify the strengths and weaknesses of each student. They will be administered throughout the year to monitor progress, and will also be used to adjust the curriculum to address areas of need. This is an invaluable tool that will help individualize our classes and help our students reach their full potential.

### **7/8 Cats**

Recently, *eighth graders* took part in a problem-solving lab. Each group was given two identical sets of chemicals, one set with labels and one without. Students designed an activity that, based on the reaction of the known chemicals, would help them identify the unknown solutions. Through some trial and error and lots of charting, students were successful in identifying all of the chemicals properly. This lab is called Mystery Solutions and comes from Science In Motion. We modified it slightly by not providing directions, but rather allowing students to devise their own methods for testing, recording results, and figuring out the mystery chemicals.



Seventh graders are working on forces and motion. Groups of students were given wind up cars and asked to find their speed. Each group designed an activity that tested the car either on a set distance or for a certain number of times the car was wound up. Students then timed the car traveling and calculated the speed for the particular vehicle with which they were working

#### **Adolescent Coping Skills**

During the 2013-2014 academic year, counselors from Mainstream Counseling, Youth Advocate Program, and Huntingdon Middle School will be offering a peer group. 
